

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Psalm 19

The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament shows the handiwork of the Lord.

their sound has gone out into all lands, and their message to the ends of the world.

In the deep has God set a pavilion for the sun; it comes forth like a bridegroom out of his chamber; it rejoices like a champion to run its course.

It goes forth from the uttermost edge of the heavens and runs about to the end of it again; nothing is hidden from its burning heat.

The law of the Lord is perfect and revives the soul; the testimony of the Lord is sure and gives wisdom to the innocent.

The statutes of the Lord are just and rejoice the heart; the commandment of the Lord is clear and gives light to the eyes.

The fear of the Lord is clean and endures for ever; the judgements of the Lord are true and righteous altogether.

More to be desired are they than gold, more than much fine gold, sweeter far than honey, than honey in the comb.

By them also is your servant enlightened, and in keeping them there is great reward.

Who can tell how often they offend? Cleanse me from my secret faults.

Above all, keep your servant from presumptuous sins; let them not get dominion over me; then shall I be whole and sound, and innocent of a great offense.

Notes from the Director of Music

With last week's wonderful talk and presentation about the seasons of the church year, I was reminded of a children's hymn I had sung years ago. In six verses, the complete cycle of the seasons of the church are explained. I have asked that all of the verses be printed in the bulletin, but for the **Introit**, the choir will only sing a few of them.

Last week my son Christopher accidentally swallowed a little bee which stung the inside of his throat. Apparently he broke out in hives and ended up with a lump in his throat but he was still able to breathe and swallow OK. Though suffering with some discomfort, he still showed up last Sunday to do our livestream. I understand that for some reason, the bees and hornets are very active right now, so I thought I would present some music by "the three big B's": Bach, Beethoven and Brahms. Beethoven composed very little music for organ. Most of his music played on the organ are transcriptions from

his piano works. Such is the case for the **Prelude** which is one of his most famous piano pieces. I remember when I was about age 9 finding a copy of *Moonlight Sonata* at home and decided to try it out, never having heard it before. I fell in love with the piece and couldn't wait to play it for my teacher. I didn't know what a double sharp was and so brought it to him. He didn't want to hear it and told me that I wasn't ready for it and to put it away. Ready or not, rebellious youth that I was, I enjoyed the piece and continued playing it at home. I still play the piece on piano but this is my first attempt at playing on the organ.

Our last **hymn** uses the tune "Symphony" which comes from Brahms first Symphony. This magnificent chorale played by the strings, suddenly pops up in the middle of the last movement like a comforting break in the clouds.

The **Postlude**, by the greatest "B" of all time, is a good example of Bach's free-form writing, showing off the sonorities of the organ without any kind of liturgical association.
