NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

There are some great hymns connected with this day of Thanksgiving. This is an important service in the church year and I love the hymns that go with it.

The **Introit** comes from our old 1972 Book of Praise and who but Sir Arthur Sullivan (without Gilbert) could compose such a rousing hymn. The **Anthem** is an arrangement of another great hymn which should be in our hymn book.

For the organ music today, I turned to a collection of Harvest music compiled under the title "The Village Organist". This is music put together by the editor of Novello Publishing House, John Ebenezer West. These are practical pieces by mostly obscure composers, intended for organs smaller than the cathedral variety. Of course the

editor managed to sneak in a couple of his own pieces. The introduction to the **first Hymn** is by John E. West, who also composed the **Postlude**. The Postlude is based on Joseph Barnby's anthem "O Lord, How Manifold". West was born into a musical family in 1863 and went on to be organist and choir director at different posts in London. He was editor of Novello & Company for 45 years and managed to have nearly 500 of his compositions published. In 1929, while conducting a choir at Westminster Central Hall, he collapsed on stage and died while doing what he loved.

Anthem: Sing to the Lord of Harvest

Sing to the Lord of harvest, sing songs of love and praise; With joyful hearts and voices your alleluias raise! By Him the rolling seasons in fruitful order move; Sing to the Lord of harvest a song of happy love.

By Him the clouds drop fatness, the deserts bloom and spring, The hills leap up in gladness, the valleys laugh and sing. He filleth with His fullness, all things with large increase; He crowns the year with goodness, with plenty, and with peace.

Heap on His sacred altar the gifts His goodness gave, The golden sheaves of harvest, the souls He died to save. Your hearts lay down before Him when at His feet ye fall, And with your lives adore Him who gave His life for all.

Giving Thanks
